of conditions affecting our economy such as the increase in jobless claims, the nation's housing crisis, and the strict, financial institutions' lending criteria, it is more difficult now to purchase a home than it was two years ago. For the families that have lost their homes for one reason or another, or have money to buy a home, but can't qualify for a conventional loan, SCIG may have a solution for many.

SCIG's mission is to help communities within the County of Solano by offering home ownership to those with less than stellar credit and those who can't qualify for a bank loan. Their Rent-to-Own and seller financing programs allow for homeownership in cases where it would not otherwise be possible.

Homeownership in a community can instill a sense of pride and create opportunities for growth and revitalization. The

tenant/buyer has aspirations to purchase the home and hopefully has a stronger commitment to the community. SCIG provides a direct path to support this goal. "Homeownership is a privilege and takes a commitment. We have to get back to the basics. The American dream is very much alive. I love Vallejo, and our community will thrive again when families return to homeownership" states Caroline Hegarty, founder of SCIG. The relationships SCIG has established within Solano County has allowed them to purchase

multiple homes monthly, quickly rehab them and place them back on the market for resale or rent to own.

One of SCIG's goal is to be a go-between for those who want to be homeowners with financiers (private lenders) who want to have a direct impact by investing in the County. SCIG obtains funds from private lenders to acquire properties and offer seller financing. The definition of a private lender in this case is an individual who negotiates directly, on a personal basis, terms to loan money for real estate investments. These are individuals from all walks of life. They do not lend money as a business, but have some form of capital with which they wish to invest.

In return for the use of the funds from private lenders, they receive negotiated rate of return on their investment, usually at 7.5%, as well as a secured note on the property. The refurbished home will be their direct collateral. By partnering with the private sector who have money to invest, SCIG has created a program that is beneficial for the community. They can offer tailored terms to those who want to buy a home, but can't qualify through a lending institution. "Because of SCIG's buying strategies we can offer home ownership to families for the same amount of money, or less than they would spend on a rental arrangement." asserts Hegarty.

"We ARE investing in Main Street, not Wall Street!"

Hegarty continues "We are working with regular people who are possibly making a 2% to 4% return on their investments (i.e. CD or IRA) and want to earn a higher return. We securitize their investment by giving them a first lien on a house which is a tangible asset, in their community. The private lender receives the benefit of at least a 7.50% return on their money while helping someone get into a home."

A potential buyer interested in seller financing, lease options, or rent to own terms would need to complete a Uniform Residential Loan Application (Form 1003), provide proof of income, tax returns, job stability, and/or a down payment. We also connect these buyers with the necessary tools to help them return to financial institution guidelines, including working with our other resources such as credit repair, debt consolidation, budgeting etc.





Fairfield and Suisun city offer the perfect blend of an old and new, quaint and modern, peaceful and exciting atmosphere. After a quiet start as tiny frontier villages in the 1850's, Fairfield and Suisun City have recently undergone dramatic expansion in size and population. This growth reflects a positive trend. The friendliness, charm and informality of these former pioneer towns have not been lost with the growth of the last 25 years.

People are steadily recognizing the potential of Fairfield and Suisun City as a desirable place to raise a family and establish a business. The area is small enough not to have lost its Old West appeal and neighborhood feel, yet large enough to attract and support such major industries as military, agriculture, biotechnology and manufacturing.

The County Seat, Fairfield occupies 37 square miles of relatively level land in the northeast San Francisco Bay Area, on the western edge of California's agricultural heartland, the Central Valley. Although sometimes perceived as a bedroom community to the San Francisco and Sacramento metropolitan areas, Fairfield contains the full range of residential uses, a premier central business district, extensive transportation networks, world-class healthcare, quality schools and the finest cultural assets in all of Solano County.

South of Fairfield is the charming community of Suisun City, encompassing four square miles and containing the largest fresh water marsh in the county. The city was founded in 1851 during the California Gold Rush as a trading route between the foothills of the Sierra Nevada and the San Francisco Bay Area. The Old Town section of the city is located on the Suisun Channel which empties on the Suisun and Grizzly Bays, the connecting point for the Sacramento River and the San Francisco Bay. The Suisun Marsh has a large marina that goes into the California Delta.

The town continued to prosper with the introduction of the transcontinental railroad in 1869, linking Suisun City to the east coast. The city remained the bustling hub of agricultural Solano County until Interstate 80 opened in the 1960's, effectively

switching commercial traffic away from the railroad and the waterfront area, and into nearby Fairfield. Suisun City undertook the task of completely reconstructing the waterfront. The city also completed the 5,000-foot

promenade walkway in October 1998, which opened the entire waterfront for public access. The promenade connects the Town Plaza with a 300-foot guest dock, the Harbormaster Building, and the marina.

Despite their dramatic growth, Fairfield and Suisun City maintain the charm and vitality of small, thriving communities. Beautiful tree-lined streets and well-kept boulevards lead to a wide variety of shopping, dining, educational and recreation options.







I have lived here in the North Bay all my life growing up in the Vallejo/Benicia community. My father was brought to Vallejo because of the Navy and stayed at Mare Island for 44 years. My

mother was a nurse at Kaiser, so between my parents and my 5 brothers and sisters I felt like we knew everyone. We were practically raised at St. Vincent's Grammar School and our world was simple and seemed to not change as we aged. Through the years change did occur, and I have seen Benicia and Vallejo change before my eyes. The surrounding communities, Suisun, Fairfield, American Canyon and Vacaville changed just as dramatically. When I was in 6th grade my best friend moved to Napa and it

became a common stomping ground over my teenage years. Napa was one of those places I remember as a child being a little bit country and maybe even a little, *slow*. Not that I mean that as a bad thing, in fact that is probably where I fell in love with horses and country living. Napa, or Wine Country, as it

is commonly referred to, seemed not to change as dramatically and it stayed a little bit country because of the vineyards. (That did not exist when I was growing up!) Through the years I have seen Napa County change but not really Napa proper. Downtown Napa, in fact seemed doomed to have the name but not the destination since "Napa Valley" was really talking about Yountville and above. Well, times are changing!

If you have never been to

Downtown Napa and you went today it would look as if it existed there always. If you are in fact like myself and know Downtown Napa well and went today it would look like a new city! The

skyline is in fact a vision over the river now. This vision did not happen overnight nor without its growing pains, I remember the last couple years trying to get to restaurants and stores and cursing over the lack of parking and the street rubble. I know many merchants and restauranteurs struggled since their customers could not get to them conveniently.

Downtown Napa is finally attaining their namesake and becoming a true destination. What has made this radical change? Many little things have happened over the last decade, Copia, Ox Bow Market; fabulous restaurants like Celedon, Angele and Cole's, wine shops and specialty retail have brought residents and tourists alike. Almost overnight though the skyline changed with one man's vision and lots of hard work – *Riverfront* was created.



From San Francisco Bay to the Mare Island Straits of Vallejo, sailing enthusiasts are readying themselves to embrace wind and waves. For over one hundred years, sailing craft of all types have celebrated the official start of the sailing season in a region well known for its maritime heritage and superb sailing conditions.

Opening Day on the Bay takes place April 17 and 18 at the Vallejo and Benicia yacht clubs and one week later on April 25 in San Francisco followed by the Solano Yacht Club in Suisun City on May 1. The Opening Day festivities include a theme based boat parade in which both crew and craft dress up for the event. The Vallejo event is a two day floating party with hundreds of boats expected to be over-nighting in and around the Mare Island Straits between the City of Vallejo and the industrial landscape that is the historic Mare Island Naval Shipyard.

There will be plenty to do for those of us who aren't "yachties". Benicia will have food and craft vendors as well as live music in and around downtown First Street and adjacent to the Benicia Yacht Club. There will also be a rubber duckie race

Downtown Benicia really comes alive all day for this event. Most of First Street will be closed to automobile traffic, making the event ideal for families. The eclectic mix of shops and restaurants that make Benicia so charming will, of course, be open.

Go out on the downtown Benicia Pier, at the foot of First Street, for a good view, or spread out on the Waterfront Green, just North of the pier, for a little sun, and a more leisurely take on the festivities. There is also a water spigot on the green at the corner of First and East B. St. providing water for canine companions.

The sun will set at 7:33 PM on April 17. With the clear weather prevalent this time of year, the light turns this little piece of the California coast yellow and lavender as the light cascades across the water and over the boats. The Sun finally slips past the Zampa Bridge, leading into Vallejo to the West.

On Saturday May 1 The Great Vallejo Race starts in The San Francisco Bay. Hundreds of boats will round a single mark as they pass Alcatraz Island on their way to Vallejo for the first day of the race. Boats will pass under the Richmond San Rafael Bridge and into San Pablo Bay and the Carquinez Straits. The race finishes in the Mare Island Straits below the mouth of the Napa River.

The run to Vallejo is usually a downwind reach ideal for spinnaker flying. These large and brightly colored sails are the largest in any boat's suit. They create quite a spectacle. Hundreds of boats maneuvering for the finish line perpendicular to the Vallejo waterfront is a display of sailing tactics as well. Tempers frequently flare as boats bunch together and jockey for advantage in the often


quirky winds that swirl and dip as they are disrupted by Mare Island. Listen for skippers yelling "starboard" as they shout their right of way under the rules of racing sail. Sometimes hulls come into contact in spite of the best maneuvering efforts.

Having started 111 years ago, The Great Vallejo Race is a venerated event, but it is not the oldest race in the world of sailing, nor is it the longest in terms of distance or duration. However, with between 300 and 500 boats participating annually, it is one of the largest displays of competitive sail to be seen anywhere in the world. Expect the fastest boats to reach the finish line around 3 PM depending on the wind. The first boat across the line isn't necessarily the winner though. The winning boat is determined using a handicap system to equalize the faster and slower craft. This makes it a competition based on sailing skill and tactics rather than money and equipment.

After the race participants drop their sails and anchor or berth for the night. Party time!

The racing resumes in the morning with thousands of yards of wind filled sail again jamming the Mare Island Straits as pastel colored cranes from the shipyard stretch their necks. This time the course is in the opposite direction with the finish line just short of the Richmond-San Rafael Bridge.

The beauty and tradition of sailing in the waterways of coastal California are worth experiencing. There will be plenty to do on both land and sea.



Next month, is the 17th year of what has been hailed as one of the Bay Area's most diverse, vibrant and accessible Open Studios. Benicia is fortunate to host a large population of studio artists whose work has been shown in both regional and national shows; as well as exciting emerging artists, and many others who are dedicated to pursuing art as a serious avocation. During the first weekend of May, the whole town of Benicia comes alive in a celebration for the arts as artists open their work spaces city wide. On May 1st and 2nd, over sixty of Benicia's resident artists, whose studios are located throughout the town and the lower historic arsenal district, will be graciously welcoming the public into their studios. This rare opportunity to visit the artist's inner sanctum allows visitors a glimpse of the places where the artists while the hours away, working endlessly. These workspaces are filled with works in progress, as well as substantial bodies of completed work. Each year, the wealth of talent that these artists share with the community and with hundreds of visitors from around the Bay Area during Open Studios is truly remarkable, and not to be missed.

Open Studios is an unparalleled opportunity to meet the creators of work admired during the year at the Arts Benicia Gallery and other venues around town, explore more about one's favorite kind of art, or gain a new understanding of art that might seem elusive out of context. The artists are interested in more than simply showing their work; they generally welcome questions and comments from their visitors and are interested in engaging in discussion throughout the event. These artists work very hard, often by themselves, day in and day out throughout the year. Open Studios is an opportunity for them to engage with the community in Benicia as well as the broader Bay Area about their bodies of work.

Open Studios hours are from 10 am to 5 pm on May 1<sup>st</sup> and 2nd: there will be maps to all the studios, a group exhibit of all the participants' work, drinks and snack concessions, and live performances of encaustic and printmaking at the Arts Benicia Classroom studiofrom the Jazz for All Occasions trio at the Arts Benicia Gallery at 991 Tyler Street in the Arsenal.

Two artist studios that are no stranger to the press is Smyers Glass and Nourot Glass Studios.

It is no secret that the quiet town of Benicia has been it's own glassblowing mini-mecca since the 1970s. The credit to such a distinction should be particularly attributed to the inhabitants of 675 E. H St., Benicia: Nourot Glass Studio and Smyers Glass, Inc.





"It's really pretty unusual to have two glass studios next to each other, basically working in one location," says Judy Keyes, co-owner and designer of Smyers Glass. "I don't think that's done anywhere else." Her husband, co-owner and glassblower Stephen Smyers, finds the two-in-one locale to be quite complemental. "We've become more of a destination by having the two studios, rather than just one," he says. "We've had less competition and jealousy than you would imagine. It's worked out."

The relationship between the two studios truly began by chance. Smyers Glass began across the street of where they are now in 1971 as the first glassblowing studio in Benicia. Micheal Nourot, founder of Nourot Glass Studio, soon moved in next door in 1974. "I wasn't planning on being next to someone like that but it just happened to work out that that particular building was right next to his," says Nourot. "The rent was \$350 a month and it included utilities. The guy that owned the buildings didn't know that glassblowers—even back then—were using \$1000 bucks a month in gas; so it was a pretty sweet deal. It took the guy about a year to figure it out." It didn't take long for Nourot to convince Smyers he was of no threat. "I had my own agenda," Nourot says. "Eventually the door opened and we got to be really good friends."

The two studios remain completely separate entities under one roof, both unique in their artistic approach. "As much as it's the same it's also quite different," says Smyers. "I've specialized in tableware—bowls, candlesticks, vases—but the majority of

pieces are stemware items. I have entire lines of stemware, one line has 18 shapes and sizes." Keyes agrees, "We do mostly functional work. Now we're getting into more decorative kinds of pieces. We came out with three new lines of vases this year; paperweights, jewelry, clocks..."

Nourot Glass differs from the earliest aspect of creation. "We make all of our own glass from scratch," Nourot. "There's no studio that I can think of that's like us, that does that." His wife, business partner and glassblower fellow Corcoran sees the appeal to their creations from a deeper

perspective. "Our [studio] appeals to people that want to say end, they can certainly be halted. In the case of these Benician more than: 'I went shopping for you,"' she says. "People who don't mind that the pieces are different love our stuff. They love to discover the difference between one piece and another in pattern, shape and form."

Nourot and Corcoran's son Nick has found a career in the glass business as well. "I studied glass in Oregon for four years," he says. "I was going to move up to Seattle—the hub of glassblowing for the States." Upon reaching Seattle, however, he realized then where he's really meant to be. "I wanted to get a job, learn more stuff, learn different techniques—all the guys that I interviewed with were friends of my parents," he laments. "Every single one of them said: 'Why don't you just work for your parents?' So I came down here."

Both of these incredible studios have had more than just their 15 minutes of fame throughout the last 30-40 years. Smyers Glass has had distant clients as far away as India, Italy, Japan,

Costner, Robin Williams: and has been featured in magazines, commercials, and movies such as Swordfish and Back to the Future. Nourot Glass has made it to the far reaches of Paris, Saudi Arabia, Korea; been purchased by political icons such as President Ronald Reagan, Hilary Clinton, the Pope; and featured in the TV movie Alchemy in Light for National Geographic. The list of prestige between these two glassmaking teams is enough for a story of it's own.

While all good things don't necessarily come to an

glassblowers, as well as the rest of the country, the economy has taken its toll.

"I was retired for 10 years," says Corcoran. "It was wonderful, we had it pretty good for a long time. Now we're getting used to the new world order here. I'm using old skills, doing a lot of things that I used to do in the 70s." Nourot Glass Studio used to have a strong team to handle some of the lesser tasks in the glassmaking process. "At one time I had 11 employees," says Nourot, now down to primarily himself, his wife and son. "The problem with our wholesale business is so many accounts that we've been selling to for more than 30 years ran into the same kinds of problems that we've run into-nobody buying the work—and they're just retiring and closing down the galleries," he says. "We've lost a tremendous number of galleries that used to carry and sell our work."

Smyers Glass is right there with them. "It's about the same now

as it was in the beginning," says Smyers. "It took me a few years before I had my first employee, I eventually had 22, and now I'm back down to two." Accounting for bare necessities such as food, clothing and shelter, Keyes looks at their situation practically. "People don't necessarily need our items," she says. "It's for people with discretionary income, of which there is less of today." But things could certainly be worse, and Keyes remains fully optimistic. "We're still here! A lot of our contemporaries are not."

One of the best parts of the glassmaking business is the people you meet. "They're very interesting people, very creative, just kind of fun to be around," says Keyes. "We have friends all over the world that we have connected with over the last 30-40 years. Everywhere we go we have friends." Nourot agrees. "We get some really interesting characters in here," he says. "They all love to talk about the glass."

Smyers is still in it for the challenge. "Something new comes up everyday; a new hurdle that I need to get through. It's absolutely amazing how it could happen everyday, and it does," he says. "Maybe something went wrong, went right, a new type of commission, it keeps me on my toes. It's been an endless process, I like that part."

After nearly four decades of Smyers and Nourot, there is still much for us to look forward to. "I'm not done," says Smyers. "I'd be happy with my accomplishments if I quit right now, but I'm going to continue for a few more years and probably change my focus to one-of-a-kind gallery pieces. I haven't finished."


Nourot's mind is in a similar place. "I love what I'm doing, and right now we're working on a lot of new ideas," he says. "I've got more ideas and more stuff I want to work on than I'm probably every going to be able to. People ask me what I'm going to do when I retire and I just look at them and laugh, because I feel like I've been cheating for 40 years."

The Triple Crown of Thoroughbred Racing (although sometimes shortened to Triple Crown, the full name is used to avoid possible confusion with other sports) consists of three races for three-year-old Thoroughbred horses. Winning all three of these Thoroughbred horse races is considered the greatest accomplishment of a Thoroughbred racehorse. Different nations where thoroughbred racing is popular each have their own Triple Crown series. In recent years, winning a Triple Crown has become a very rare achievement, with most horses specializing on a limited range of distances.

In the United States, the three races that compose the Triple Crown are as follows:

Kentucky Derby, run over 1 and 1/4 miles (2.01 km) dirt track at Churchill Downs in Louisville, Kentucky;

Preakness Stakes, run over I and 3/16 miles (1.91 km) dirt track at Pimlico Race Course in Baltimore, Maryland and

Belmont Stakes, run over I and I/2 miles (2.41 km), the longest dirt track in thoroughbred racing, at Belmont Park in Elmont, New York.

No horse has won the U.S. Triple Crown since Affirmed in 1978.

Despite dropping live horse racing in its summer schedule this past year, the sport is alive and well within the confines of the Solano County Fair.

The best part? It is a year-round event.

Nestled in the north end of the fairgrounds, in Gibson Hall, patrons are treated to a little slice of a Las Vegas sports book, albeit just for horse racing. The Vallejo Satellite Watch and Wager facility boasts over 100 TVs, a bar and full restaurant menu for its patrons. And that doesn't include the dozens of stations where one can place a bet electronically, or even walk up to a live clerk to place your wager on a particular race.

"The nice thing is, you can be 18-and over and place a bet," Watch and Wager Facility Manager Rene Edens said. "There is a full service restaurant, hot and cold food, daily specials and a full bar."

Horse racing has been a long tradition in Vallejo. Last season, its 60<sup>th</sup> at the fairgrounds, was the fairs final year of live racing. The main reason for the sport's exit was the cost to keep the operation going. The facilities were in dire need of renovation, which according to Edens would have cost the fair 8- to 10-million dollars to be brought up to the standards of tracks in the fair circuit. That type of investment just would not have been worth the time to recoup the money.

"It would have taken us a decade, if not two, to break even," Edens explained. "There is a lot to be said about being a live meet. Even if you are live track, it is unbelievable how many people are gathered around the TV. "

And that is where the Satellite Wager facility comes in.

Vallejo's facility has actually been opened since 1988. The original location of the facility was in the grandstands at the track. In 1991, however, it was moved to Gibson Hall. By the summer of 1998, it was given a full facelift.

Walking into the facility now, one gets a true feeling of being in a Nevada gaming room, except the only thing on the TV's is horse racing. With the walls covered in dark green, warm ambient lighting, television screens ranging from 20 to 60 inches covering the walls and ceilings, there is plenty of gaming action. There are even outdoor patios with TVs so patrons can enjoy the outdoors while watching the racing. And to top it off, the facility does not just broadcast local California races.

"We take racing from around the World," Edens said.

At the end of March, the facility carried races from Dubai and regularly carries races from South America, Australia and Canada. The biggest American races will be available for wager in Vallejo coming up soon as well.

The Triple Crown will be held starting with the Kentucky Derby on May 1. The Preakness Stakes is held June 6 and the Belmont Stakes will be held June 6. And despite those races being in the MidWest and East Coast, racing fans will be able to place bets

right in their own backyard and watch the events with fellow horse racing enthusiasts.

The Kentucky Derby is a Grade I stakes race for three year-old Thoroughbred horses, held annually in Louisville, Kentucky, United States on the first Saturday in May, capping the twoweek-long Kentucky Derby Festival and is widely considered the most prestigious horse race in the world. The race is one and a quarter miles (2 km) at Churchill Downs. Colts and geldings carry 126 pounds (57.2 kg) and fillies 121 pounds (54.9 kg). The race is known in the United States as "The Most Exciting Two Minutes in Sports" or "The Fastest Two Minutes in Sports" for its approximate duration, and is also called "The Run for the Roses" for the blanket of roses draped over the winner. It is the first leg of the United States Triple Crown of Thoroughbred Racing and is followed by the Preakness Stakes then the Belmont Stakes. The attendance at the Kentucky Derby ranks first in North America and usually surpasses the attendance of all other stakes races including the Preakness Stakes, Belmont Stakes and the Breeders' Cup.

"The Kentucky Derby, at one time, was biggest sporting event in the world," Eden said. "Nobody's facility is big enough for the first weekend in May. It has actually turned into a 2-day event, with the Kentucky Oaks running on Friday."

The Triple Crown shouldn't be the only reason to go place a wager on the ponies, however. The Vallejo facility is open Tuesday through Sunday. Admission is \$5 before 4 p.m., \$3 at night. It is an 18-and-over facility. During the week of the fair, admission is free to the center with a paid fair entrance, which may be the perfect time for a beginner to check out the horse racing action.

"If you want to come down during the fair and take chance in a wager, come on down," Edens said. "We are the only game in town."

#### **FYI**

Affirmed (February 21, 1975 – January 12, 2001) was an American thoroughbred race horse who was the eleventh and most recent winner of the United States Triple Crown of Thoroughbred Racing. He was the great-great-grandson of Triple Crown winner War Admiral through damsire Crafty Admiral, and thereby the great-great grandson of Man o' War who won two of the three Triple Crown races himself. He has other noteworthy horses in his pedigree like Gallant Fox, winner of 1930 Triple Crown and sire of the 1935 Triple Crown Winner Omaha. A well as English Derby winner Mahmoud.

Affirmed is also known for his famous rivalry with Alydar, whom he met ten times, including in all three Triple Crown races, and who became the first racehorse to finish second in all three Triple Crown races.

# Touro University California: A Passion for Serving, A Passion for Caring

In June 1999 when Touro University California officials first arrived on historic Mare Island to begin work on the land they had leased, it was more of a ghost island. A guard who was stationed at the Henry D. Wichels Causeway entry to the island was prohibiting all unauthorized entrants from proceeding. Many of the buildings that Touro University had leased were boarded up, and the now grassy hills were brown and shrubs were seriously overgrown.

But the late President Dr. Bernard Lander, who founded the orthodox Jewish Touro College system which includes Touro University, had a vision of converting the southern portion of the former naval shipyard into a high-caliber graduate institution that could educate highly skilled public health professionals and educators. When it opened its doors in the fall of that year, Touro University California housed only the College of Osteopathic Medicine with 214 registered students. Since then, the university has renovated six of the 23 leased buildings into state-of the-art classrooms, a high-tech library, research laboratories, administrative offices, a kosher cafeteria, and Shabbat and Jewish High Holy Day services are celebrated on campus. It currently has 1,412 registered students and has expanded to include the College of Education, College of Health Sciences and College of Pharmacy.

On March 10, Touro University officially purchased the 44-acre portion of Mare Island that it leased, thus cementing its roots in the Vallejo community. Vallejo Mayor Osby Davis hailed the acquisition as an important step in establishing the city's image as a university town, which in the long-term will boost the prospects

for economic development. In addition to Touro University, Vallejo is home to the California Maritime Academy and a local campus of the Solano Community College, providing the city with a solid base of student consumers.

Over the years, Touro University has become a hub of public health services and partnerships for the neighboring school districts grappling with the challenges faced by urban school systems. The university currently has formal affiliation agreements with numerous public health agencies located in five counties within the greater San Francisco Bay Area. Touro also has institutional partnerships with Jimma University in Ethiopia, the Shirati Hospital in Tanzania, as well as with the Arcos Hospital and El Niño Hospital in La Paz, Bolivia, which allow students to spend months abroad providing health services for underserved populations in those countries.

Each of Touro's four colleges has left its own unique public service imprint. The College of Health Sciences requires that its public health and physician assistant students engage in between 200 and 400 hours of public health field experience, depending on the degree the student is seeking. Some of these students, for example, recently worked with Planned Parenthood in Fairfield, supporting their teen pregnancy prevention and intervention program. The student interns developed a survey for the agency, conducted telephone interviews with the organization's clients and organized workshops to address the issues that most concerned teenagers surveyed.

"We have had such good luck with the students from Touro University," said Trishka Lampkin, case manager for Planned

Parenthood. "They are very responsive and supportive. They are self-motivated and hit the road running."

Director of the Public Health Program Assefaw Tekeste Ghebrekidan said, "If our graduates are to be successful public health professionals, they need to engage in this kind of work directly. They need to serve medically underserved communities."

The College of Osteopathic Medicine differentiates itself in part through its focus on osteopathy, an approach to health care that emphasizes

the role of the musculoskeletal system in treating illnesses and in maintaining health. The majority of graduating Touro medical students go into primary care as opposed to specialized care. Nationally, most medical schools are graduating an increasing number of specialists, which is creating a national shortage of primary care physicians. Top administrators are planning a national conference scheduled for June 3rd on the campus entitled, "Primary Care and Serving the Underserved."

The university also operates the Touro University Community Clinic located in Glen Cove, which serves mainly a low-income population with 90 percent of its clientele being on Medi-Cal. Additionally, third-year and fourth-year medical students are required to rotate through various hospitals so they can get first-hand experience delivering health care. They serve in hospitals throughout the state from San Bernardino in the south to Eureka



in the north. Touro has rotation students in most of the major hospitals in the region but is seeking to strengthen placements in the area so that ultimately more students come to see this region as their home and take up practice here upon graduation.

Touro medical, pharmacy and public health students also serve the community by participating in

the free clinics established in the Vallejo Unified School District, the Suitcase Clinic in Berkeley and the Street Level Health Project in Oakland among other projects. These students were a core component of the university's recent H1N1 vaccination campaign conducted in partnership with the Solano County Department of Health.

Dean of the College of Osteopathic Medicine Michael Clearfield said. "With issues looming which will demand even more of our healthcare systems, Touro University's College of Osteopathic Medicine is proud to continue its tradition of producing the finest physician for the future, today."

The College of Pharmacy has likewise carved out its own niche in service to the community. Registering its first class in fall of 2005, college administrators take pride in the fact that a substantial percentage of its graduates go on to practice in the region.

#### Touro's

#### Global Health Program

Touro medical, pharmacy and public health students are particularly passionate about their work in Tanzania, Ethiopia and Bolivia, which is conducted through the Touro Global Health Program.

Each year students and faculty travel to rural villages in these countries to learn about the needs of these communities. They have worked to serve medical needs and have helped build structures that will provide clean drinking water and improved sanitation. For example, Touro students and faculty recently assessed a clinic in Shirati, Tanzania that provides long-term care for lepers. Touro students found that, although the basic needs of the clinic patients were being addressed, the patients complained of extremely poor diets with meat rarely served as part of their meals. Students consequently started a vegetable garden for the clinic and bought chickens and built a chicken coop to improve their diets.

In a separate project in Shirati, students helped construct a mill in that village that now grinds grains locally and generates income for the neediest residents. Touro's support is greatly appreciated as evidenced by one Shirati clinic that proudly displays a one-story Touro University logo on its front wall.

"The North Bay area has historically had a shortage of pharmacists, and the number of graduates remaining in the area to practice has helped to meet this need," said Katherine Knapp, Dean of the College of Pharmacy.

This College gained substantial recognition within the field when it developed what it calls the "Triple Jump Exam" that all first-year and second-year pharmacy students are required to take. This examination received an Excellence in Assessment Award from the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy in 2009. Touro pharmacy students also won first place in all three major clinical skills competitions at the 2009 California Society of Health-Systems Pharmacists Seminar, beating USC, UCSD and UCLA.


The College of Education has acquired prominence locally because of the high caliber education it provides to aspiring teachers and to educators who want to strengthen their credentials. Last year, it provided, at no cost to local school districts, two all-day math teacher development workshops geared to improving the quality of mathematics instruction. This academic year it sponsored a series of Sunday speakers and recruited well-known national education scholars who provided critical insights and strategies to help resolve the challenges facing regional schools. The speaker series has sparked such interest that it led to the formation of a coalition with the Vallejo Unified School District, the Vallejo Chamber of Commerce, the Solano Community Foundation and the Ford Partnership for Advanced Studies, as well as other local businesses. Working with this coalition, the College of Education will host its final Sunday presentation on April 11 at 2 p.m. This session will focus on identifying strategies for increasing high school graduation rates and preparing today's youth for the world of work. It will also commemorate Holocaust survivors.

Dean of the College of Education Jim O'Connor said, "Our goal is to work collaboratively with local school districts and to focus our curricula for teachers and administrators on working with at-risk, urban students. We also employ some of the most talented local teachers and administrators to teach our courses. As a result, our students are armed with an arsenal of current and effective teaching strategies."

Touro's Provost and Chief Operating Officer Marilyn Hopkins said she is proud of the exceptional public service provided by Touro University faculty and students.

"Touro University is committed to serving communities locally and internationally," she said. "Such public service provides students with hands on experiences and gives them such a depth of understanding. I look forward to strengthening our ties with regional public health agencies so we can place more of our students locally and encourage them to make local communities their home when they graduate."

The Bay Area is a wonderful place to be and now is a wonderful time to get out and enjoy this glorious time of year. We have the fortune to begin to enjoy the outdoors again, earlier than most, taking hikes amongst the local wild flowers and drives through some of the most diverse landscape this country has to offer. The bay though is calling us by showing off its aqua green colors on those sunny days. The gentle surf is licking the mossy rocks that ring it and the sail

boats are beginning to unfurl their bright sails into the gentle wind. If you are fortunate you will be enjoying these days ON the bay. Maybe you are lounging on a spacious yacht or perhaps rowing on a tiny dingy but there is always something to enjoy on the bay while you search surf and horizon for the playful seals dancing in the water.

No sailing or boating trip on the bay would be complete without a compliment of food and beverages (of the adult kind) of course. Choosing what food and drink to enjoy on these perfect days is the question and, in my opinion, wholly dependent on the time of day - morning, noon or night.




Mother always said to me; "Start you day with a good breakfast" AND a wise man once said; "If you are going to drink all day, you better start early." So, my suggestion is to start your adventure right and compliment it with a mimosa or a Bloody Mary. I often ask myself these questions and my rule of thumb is: if you have to ask the question – you already know the answer! So, YES to both – I have included a delightful recipe for Bloody Mary's that my friend concocted called the BBB-M (Barry's BaaaadAss Bloody Mary). If you enjoy fresh vegetables and a little spice in your life you will enjoy this immediately. If citrus and a splash of the bubbly is more your style and what you are craving – then a Mimosa is the way to go. Both of these are easily complimented with fresh fruit and perhaps some fresh baked pastry from Sweetie Pies in Napa.

Now if you're starting your day a touch later and we are now talking Lunch – Whoa Nelly! This is entirely a different ball game. We can venture into the wine and beer arena. A warm sunny day on the bay cruising on a sail boat would call for Antica Chardonnay in my opinion. The Antica Chardonnay exhibits a rich and creamy layered mix of ripe pear, apricot, spice, and citrus notes that provide freshness and vibrancy to the wine and it goes very well with that fresh salty air of the bay. If you enjoy red though I would recommend to go light and pair the day with a pinot noir. My recommendation would be Patz & Hall Jekins Ranch "Sonoma Coast" Pinot Noir 2007. This wine is intense, nervy and structured, with beautiful density, lots of flavor and sweet, balanced tannins that add poise. The aromas are layered

and complex, highlighting cranberry, dusty cherry and dried strawberries, with nuances of mint, blueberry, sandalwood and French toast. On the palate, the red-fruit flavors continue and are underscored by a sweet, supple mid-palate and a cleansing acid finish. Let's not forget something to eat and my suggestion would be for some pate', a creamy cheese and a fresh baguette with a wonderful crust. Who could ignore the nautical theme of submarine sandwich, perhaps one from your favorite deli with freshly sliced meats and cheeses and high enough to make even Dagwood envious.

Evening— hell — it's dark out! Drink whatever fits your fancy and gaze upon waters of the San Francisco bay as the lights of the city sparkle across the sea. Jeeezzzz... enough said! If you need a recommendation though, I am always glad to oblige. A fuller Chardonnay would be what I would seek at this time of day and the 2007 Chardonnay Reserve from Artesa's Carneros Estate would be my first choice here. A full bodied red would also fit the bill very nicely on our always cool evenings and will be sticking with Antica, their Cabernet Sauvignon offers pure, ripe fruit centered on the flavors of currant and unfolding to subtle hints of both blackberry and black cherry flavors. For food, it can be as simple as a cheese platter to a full 5 course meal. - the choice will depend on the time your started your adventure. If you started early in the day and you took that wise man's advice of starting early then perhaps you need to finish the day with a warm plate of pasta!







Enjoy your spring time. Be it on the land or the sea you can't go wrong enjoying it here in the San Francisco Bay area. If these days include some late rain, enjoy that too – cuddled up warmly on those days that the sun plays hooky too.

#### BBB-M (Barry's BaaaadaAss Bloody Mary)

Ingredients (Makes 12):

- 1 ½ Pounds plum tomatoes
- 1 Large carrot, peeled, coarsely chopped
- 1 Large golden beet, peeled, coarsely chopped
- 1 Small fennel bulb, trimmed, coarsely chopped
- 1 Large garlic clove, chopped
- 1 Bay leaf
- 1 Tablespoon plus 1 ½ teaspoon of coarse kosher salt
- 3 Tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- ½ Teaspoon celery seeds
- 6. Tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 Tablespoon hot pepper sauce
- 1 Tablespoon grated peeled fresh horseradish
- 2 Teaspoons coarsely ground whole black peppercorns
- Teaspoon hot chili sauce (such as sriracha)
- 1/4 Cup of Guinness (optional)
- Cups of vodka or gin of your choice
  - Ice Cubes
  - Lime Wedges
  - Pickled Vegetables (such as okra, green beans or jalapeños) Preparation:

Place first 6 ingredients in large pot. Add enough water just to cover (about 6 cups). Bring to boil; reduce heat to medium and simmer uncovered until vegetables are very soft, about 50 minutes.

Discard bay leaf. Add 1 tablespoon coarse salt and lemon juice; cool slightly. Working in batches, puree vegetable mixture in blender until smooth. Add enough water, if needed, to measure 8 cups. Cover and chill.

Grind celery seeds with remaining 1 ½ teaspoons coarse salt in mortar with pestle or in spice grinder. Add celery-seed salt, Worcestershire sauce, hot pepper sauce, hot chili sauce and Guinness, if desired, to vegetable puree. Cover and chill Blood Mary mix overnight.

Stir Blood Mary mix and vodka or gin in large pitcher. Fill tall glass with ice. Divide Blood Mary amount glasses. Garnish with lime wedges and pickled vegetables.

We always considered Solano County our "home" and since we were away from each other all week we would reserve Friday night for our "date nights." Our date nights are spent exploring a restaurant that we haven't been to or a favorite restaurant where we have the same meal we had the last time we were there. Over the years we like to think we have eaten at most restaurants in Napa and Solano Counties. (and beyond!) I personally am what they call a "Sally" from *When Harry Met Sally* fame, persnickety is another name for my eating habits. I would also venture to say that I am probably the only person I

know that does not like Mexican Food. With that being said, is it any wonder I had never been to "Favela's Fusion," a Mexican Restaurant in Fairfield right near our home.

At a recent Fairfield/Suisun Chamber mixer I was fortunate enough to meet Edgar, the co-owner of Favelas's. He was introduced to me through a fellow restauranteur and I was told Favela's had the BEST Mexican Food in town. As you might have thought, I didn't immediately promise to eat there. What I forgot to tell you is that my husband's favorite food is, yes you guessed it, Mexican Food!

The following week, Baillie and I went to Favela's Fusion so I could see what all the hoopla was about. Favela's is located right next door to Orchard Supply Hardware on Oliver Road right off of I-80 west in Fairfield. As I entered (we had come in separate cars since I was coming from a meeting) I was immediately



struck by the artwork on the walls – huge oil paintings that seemed to tell a story. The colors were great and I seemed to feel transported to a resort atmosphere. Sitting at the bar waiting for Baillie I read up on their specialty drinks. They are known for their Margaritas, but I decided to try a Pomegranate Martini. Baillie soon joined me and he decided to try their Margaritas, a very good choice!

I like eating at the bar and

tonight was no different as we watched sports on the flat screen TV and had cocktails. We were both impressed that they displayed over 60 types of tequila.

The menu was nothing like a traditional Mexican Restaurant that I had been to in the past, the choices were things like, Ceviche Acapulco, Rajas La Crema, Ensalada de Salmon, and Camarones al Tequila.

My husband ordered his favorite, Carnitas, and I ordered a "Fusion Burrito." This came with sauce and cheese on it and was FABULOUS! My husband was very impressed with the presentation of his carnitas with rice and beans. He remarked how moist the carnitas were and loved the rice, it had a unique flavor.

We had sat at the barfor our dinner and Edgar was able to come over and join us for a little while and told us the history of Favela's and we were able to hear his passion for the restaurant and the food.

Favelas is actually his wifes', Veronica, maiden name. She opened her first restaurant in 1989 on Texas Street in Fairfield. She went on to open other restaurants in Fairfield and Vacaville. Two years ago on June 19th, 2008 she and Edgar opened the doors to the current location at 1500 Oliver Road, in Fairfield.





"Our goal was to create an upscale restaurant that featured the foods of our culture," Veronica explained. "We definitely have burritos and tacos, but we also have Mole and Chili Rellenos."

The menu is definitely expansive and something for everyone and like the surroundings of the restaurant paint a very beautiful picture.

With over 20 years of restaurant ownership behind

them, Veronica and Edgar deserve a little time to enjoy this one that they both obviously have worked so hard on.





On June 12, 1898, General Emilio Aguinaldo declared the independence and sovereignty of the Philippine Islands. The Act of The Declaration of Independence was read by author Ambrosio Rianzares Bautista in the Philippine city of Cavite in front of a crowd at the estate of General Aguinaldo. The flag of the Philippines was also flown for the first time and the Marcha Nacional Filipina (national anthem) played for the first time on this day.

In honor of these events, Filipino communities worldwide celebrate their national pride throughout the month of June. Pista sa Nayon, roughly translated as "Town Festival" is the highlight. The Philippine Cultural Committee of Vallejo, CA will be hosting their version of the festival on Saturday, June 5.

The Vallejo Pista sa Nayon festival is one of the largest in the Bay Area with over 40,000 visitors attending last year. Festivities will start at the corner of Capitol and Marin Streets with a parade at 9:20 AM followed by an explosion of Filipino culture on the Vallejo Waterfront from 10 AM to 6 PM. Music, food, dancing, arts and crafts and almost 100 vendors engaging in revelry... island style.

In addition to acknowledging Filipino independence, Pista sa Nayon has traditionally been a celebration of a good harvest in the rural towns and villages. As such, cuisine of the Philippines will be plentiful. Lumpia, Adobo, Pancit Canton and Siopao will be a new experience for the uninitiated, and a taste of home for those from the islands. Food is an integral part of the traditions of hospitality in the Philippines. Some say that food is at the

center of the Filipino social life. Three main meals plus two snacks, a segundo almuerzo (second breakfast) and merienda (mid-afternoon snack) are not uncommon. Be sure to bring your appetite.

Expect to see many dressed in light and airy traditional Filipino attire. Men in Barong Tagalog shirts and women in ornate Maria Clara dress.

Music, singing and dancing will go all day with traditional performances as well as mainstream and popular music from Filipino performers. Filipino popular music runs the full range from ballads to hip-hop. Special guests this year include Ronnie, Eric and Jeffrey Quizon. The Quizon brothers are expected to perform a comic skit, following in the footsteps of their father Rudolpho"Dolphy"Vera Quizon one of the most famous comic actors in the Philippines.

The Philippines has always been a multi-cultural crossroads, a blending of Malay traditions and those from Spain, America and other parts of Asia. This blending is apparent in the music, language and food. Many Spanish words have been incorporated in the 170 plus dialects spoken in the Philippines. That blending of cultures continues today.

Vallejo's Filipino community comprises approximately twenty percent of the population of this ethnically diverse city. Ties between Vallejo and the Philippines go back over a hundred years. In 1898, the year of Filipino Independence, ships were still leaving from Vallejo's Mare Island Naval Shipyard to fight in



the Spanish American War and The Battle of Manila. The ships set sail right across the straits from this year's festivities. Since then, Filipinos have come back, in the opposite direction, to Vallejo to find work, raise families and settle in our community, becoming part of the tapestry of ethnic diversity Vallejo has to offer.




